Lucy Rider Meyers

Last month we talked about the early history of women in the Methodist movement here in America. How would this spirit of servanthood evolve in the years ahead? It would evolve through the efforts of Lucy Rider Meyers. Lucy's efforts produced many successes, some of them exist to this day.

Lucy was an extremely bright person. She earned a medical degree from McKendree College in Lebanon, Ill. After graduating, she taught Chemistry at her alma mater. Lucy combined her passion for teaching with her dedication to the work of the church. Her concern for that fact that there weren't any schools to train women in Christian leadership led her to raise funds to start the Chicago Training School. The purpose of the school was to “prepare young women for missions and eleemosynary activities”.¹¹ Eleemosynary is a fancy way of saying charitable.

Lucy developed a friendship and partnership with Isabella Thoburn. Isabella spent much of her life as a missionary to India. During her time in India, she saw that a deaconess program would best serve in the ability to help not just hundreds but millions of Indian women. Isabella's was so impressed at her visit to Lucy's school, that she partnered with her to start the first Methodist Deaconess Home in Chicago in 1887.



Chicago Training School

Students of the Chicago Training School were expected to spend their summers in ministry with the poor and sick in Chicago. They passed out religious material. They took the neighborhood children to Sunday School, while taking the parents and adults to church. Their studies at school included scripture, church history, Sunday School pedagogy, medicine, and singing. Other subjects added included theology, elocution, social service, women's accomplishments, and the history of the deaconess movement.

People began to take note of their work. As early as 1888 the General Conference was receiving petitions to formally adopt the work of the deaconesses. These petitions were approved and they created an administrative structure.

Graciously, Lucy recounts the moment and impact. "This endorsement was...a great help to us...It was not many months...information came to us from several cities, that Deaconess Homes were there being founded. The movement had rapidly developed into a national one."

Lucy wasn't as concerned about tracking success metrics as she was about just doing the work. She said." It has never seemed best for us to try to keep statistics of conversions, but in many instances during that summer of 1887, our workers came home, and gathering around the tea-table told of hearts touched, of prayers offered, of tears that flowed as old vows were renewed or new ones taken."

Christian Golder, an ordained elder appears to have kept some records. According to Golder, by 1903 more than 2,000 women had been trained. 700 continued in the work of a deaconess, 170 went into foreign mission service, and 150 went into home mission work. What's just as remarkable as the success in the number of trainees who completed the course of work and went on to ministerial lives is the breadth of the ministries they became involved in.

They worked in foreign missions and with prisoners. They worked with the elderly and with Sunday School programs. They worked in hospitals and orphanages. Some brave souls even worked at midnight missions in railroad stations and high crime neighborhoods. Their work in these areas exposed some ugly truths about the American dream....

Sepsis

Today I'm going to talk about **sepsis**, a medical emergency that is more common—and more dangerous—than many people realize.

Sepsis is **the body's extreme response to an infection**, which can lead to **organ failure and death if not treated quickly**.

It can start from something as simple as a urinary tract infection, pneumonia, or even a cut on the skin.

What Happens in Sepsis?

Normally, the immune system fights infection locally. In sepsis, the immune response becomes **overactive and widespread**, causing damage to the body's own tissues and organs.

This can lead to:

- Poor blood flow
- Organ dysfunction (kidneys, lungs, brain)

Septic shock (dangerously low blood pressure)

Without rapid treatment, this process can escalate very quickly.

How Common and Serious Is Sepsis?

In the United States:

- About **1.7 million adults develop sepsis each year**
 - Around **350,000 die during hospitalization or are discharged to hospice**
- 1 in 3 hospital deaths involves sepsis**

Globally:

- Approximately **49 million cases annually**
- Around **11 million deaths worldwide** (≈20% of all deaths)

Mortality rate:

- Varies by severity
- About **10% in children**, higher in adults with severe disease

Much higher if septic shock develops

□ Key message: **Sepsis is one of the leading causes of death worldwide—but many cases are preventable.**

Who Is Most at Risk?

While anyone can develop sepsis, higher-risk groups include:

- Adults **over 65** and infants
- People with **chronic conditions** (e.g., diabetes, lung disease)
- People with **weakened immune systems** (e.g., cancer, chemotherapy)
- Those with **recent surgery or hospitalization**

Pregnant or postpartum individuals

Most people who develop sepsis have **at least one underlying condition**.

Signs and Symptoms

Early recognition saves lives.

Common warning signs include:

- Fever or feeling very cold
- Fast heart rate
- Shortness of breath
- Confusion or disorientation
- Extreme pain or discomfort

Clammy or sweaty skin

□ A useful phrase: “If an infection is getting worse instead of better—think sepsis.”

Prevention: What Can We Do?

Sepsis is often preventable because it starts with infection.

Key prevention strategies:

1. Prevent infections

- Stay up to date with **vaccinations**

Manage chronic diseases carefully

2. Practice good hygiene

- Wash hands regularly
- Clean and cover wounds

Practice safe food preparation

3. Recognize symptoms early

- Know the warning signs

Seek care quickly if symptoms worsen

4. Act fast

- Sepsis is a **medical emergency**

Early treatment with antibiotics and fluids significantly improves survival

Key Take-Home Messages

- Sepsis is **life-threatening but treatable—especially if caught early**
- It can affect **anyone**, but some groups are at higher risk
- **Early recognition and rapid treatment save lives**

Preventing infections is the best defense


