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Reflections from the Rev.

This month we are going to talk about the Wesleyan Way of Salvation. John Wesley wrote a sermon on this topic called the Scriptural Way of Salvation. He based this sermon on Ephesians 2:8 which says, "By grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God" We'd be wise to add verse 9 which says, "not the result of works, so that no one may boast."

Now this sermon was almost 5,000 words in length, so no I won't recite it here. But this sermon presents a foundation to what we as United Methodists believe about salvation. So, I will pull out the important parts of this sermon.

John Wesley's teaching about salvation is one of the most important parts of our United Methodist tradition. Wesley believed salvation is more than going to heaven someday or being forgiven once. It is the way God's grace reaches us, changes us, and helps us grow into people who love God and love others.

Wesley lived in the 1700s and preached to many people who thought religion was mostly about going to church, acting respectable, or trying hard to be good. Wesley wanted people to know that real faith is deeper than that. It is about a heart changed by God's grace and a life that shows love in everyday actions.

Wesley talked about the plainness and simpleness of the "religion" of Jesus Christ. In his mind it involved two things, "the end it proposes, and the means to attain that end." What was the proposed end? Salvation. What was the means to attain this end? Faith.

Wesley often described salvation as a journey. God's grace is present at every step. Grace reaches us before we even know we need it, helps us turn toward God, forgives us, gives us new life, and keeps working in us as we grow. These steps include prevenient grace, repentance, justification, sanctification, and perfection.

Prevenient grace simply means the grace that comes before. Wesley believed God is already working in our lives before we recognize it. God nudges our conscience, helps us see what is true, and gives us the ability to respond. We do not save ourselves, but God's grace makes it possible for us to say yes. Wesley had tangible ways to identify each part of the way. Wesley refers to prevenient grace as being on the porch of a house. It is prevenient grace that moves us to repentance. The road to salvation cannot be traveled unless repentance is evident.

Concepts of repentance exist in both Judaism and Christianity. The Hebrew words for repentance are "Naham" and "Shuv". Naham is profound sorrow. Shuv is a verb that means "to turn back". The Greek term from the New Testament for repentance is "Metanoia". It literally means, to have a "change of mind". We can aspects of Judaism and Christianity in the Wesleyan Way of Salvation.

JW believed that repentance was something complex. In line with the concept of Shuv, he emphasized that repentance wasn't simply having regret for sin, it also required going in a different direction. It is God, who by the Holy Spirit, stirs up an awareness inside of us, leading to our recognition of the need for repentance. It is God who makes the first move, God who searches for his lost sheep. God who brings to light the gap between our moral code and salvation.

When God's grace wakes us up, we begin to see our need for mercy. That can be uncomfortable, but it is also a gift. Repentance means we are honest about sin, turn away from what pulls us from God, and begin moving in a new direction.

Justifying grace is God's forgiveness. Wesley refers to this as going through the door. Through faith in Jesus Christ, we are forgiven and welcomed by God. We do not earn this by being good enough. It is a gift. This is the moment when a person can know peace with God and trust that God's mercy is real. Justification began a process where works of piety and works of mercy are learned and practiced.

Wesley said that salvation is not only something God does for us, but also something God does in us. The new birth means God gives us a new heart. We begin to love what God loves, resist what harms us, and live with a new desire to follow Christ.

Sanctifying grace is God's ongoing work in us. It is the grace that helps us grow. Wesley believed the Christian life should keep moving toward holiness, not in a harsh or showy way, but in love, kindness, prayer, service, and care for people in need.

Wesley's idea of Christian perfection can sound confusing, but he did not mean that Christians become flawless. He meant that God can fill a person's heart so deeply with love that love becomes the main guide for their life. In simple words, Christian perfection is loving God and others with a whole heart.

Wesley believed we are saved by grace, not by good works. But he also believed real faith shows up in real life. Prayer, worship, reading Scripture, helping the poor, visiting the sick, and caring for others do not earn salvation. They are ways we live out the love God has given us.

Wesley's way of salvation reminds us that faith is a lifetime journey with God. God starts the work, forgives us, gives us new life, and keeps shaping us. It also reminds us that personal faith and love for others belong together.

John Wesley's way of salvation is really a story of grace. God reaches out first, invites us to turn around, forgives us through Christ, gives us new life, and helps us grow in love. For Wesley, salvation is not just about being rescued from sin. It is about becoming the people God created us to be: people who love God deeply and love others well.

Where in the way of salvation do you think you sit? Remember that we are all going on toward perfection.

God Can Use You

Have you ever wondered how you can be of service to God? Have you ever thought, "I don't have the skill set to serve"? God rarely picks someone who is prepared, He prepares the chosen!

As Jesus was getting into the boat, the man who had been demon-possessed begged to go with him. Jesus did not let him, but said, "Go home to your family and tell them how much the LORD had done for you, and how he has had mercy on you." So the man went away and began to tell in the Decapolis how much Jesus had done for him. And all the people were amazed. —Mark 5:18-20

If you want to read a great Bible story, take a moment to ponder Mark 5:1-20. It shows how Jesus and His disciples were out on the Sea of Galilee. "He must be quite a guy if he's going to take on this territory all by himself. He must have some charisma or training. I'll bet he's one of those sharp, well-educated young Pharisees who was converted down at the seminary in Jerusalem during our last visit there! Right?" someone asked.

"No," Jesus said. "Actually, he hasn't had any training at all. And frankly, he hasn't gone to school much either. As a matter of fact, mostly he has just been hanging around the cemetery lately."

"The cemetery? What is he, a funeral director? Or a gravedigger? What does he do at the cemetery?" a disciple demanded.

"Well, mainly he runs around breaking chains, cutting himself and banging his head on the stone markers. As a matter of fact, right now he's full of the devil and running around half nuts."

Do you get the idea? Only God knows the power and potential within each one of us. Isn't it amazing that He uses ordinary people like you and me to accomplish His plans? If God can use a demon-possessed man to spread the word (see Mark 5:20), then He can surely use you as well. What about you? Will you allow yourself to be an ordinary person whom God uses to do extraordinary things?

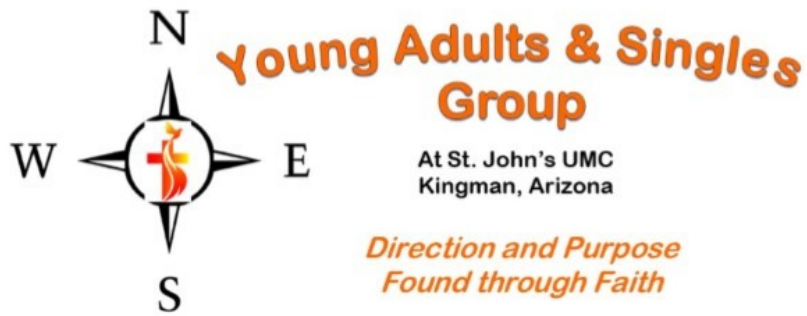
