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Reflections from the Rev.

Dear Uncle Blakeley,

It's us again, ready to tell you about our adventures this past year. We're coming up on 138 years since you preached your first sermon at St. John's Methodist Episcopal Church. Did you ever imagine that what you started would carry on like it has? There's been a few changes and now we are called St. John's United Methodist Church. We still hold the values that were so important to John Wesley as I know you did too. So with our further ado, here is our annual family Christmas letters. It's a few months early, but who doesn't love a family Christmas letter?

It is still very busy here at St. Johns and this year I decided to organize our letter a bit differently. I'm going to start out by talking about all of the things that are going well, lining them up with the elements of our purpose statement. We were indeed welcoming. We continued to be a space for those battling addictions to gather. We offer food to those who would have a lot less in their cupboard without Nana's Pantry. We are seeing a significant increase in families coming to us for help. It is with a heart of gratitude that I can mention how much this church family comes together to support this ministry. Our Lenten food drive for this year is proof. We brought in 5001 items this year and it lasted for quite a while. We welcomed around 400 people to our 2nd annual Spring Fling event. This was in spite of the record 90-degree weather that decided to show up that day. Thanks to our Outreach chair, Andrea for coordinating this event and for all of the volunteers who helped it go so smoothly. We welcomed another church to rent space from us on Sunday and Wednesday nights. 35 kids from preschool to 5th grade were welcomed to a deeper walk with God through our Snowball Mountain Challenge VBS. Thanks to Heidi Heer for directing this and for the many volunteers who made it the success that it was. One of the older kids now attends our youth group regularly. We took our welcoming spirit to the community through a Valentine's day cookie exchange for First Responders. After making up the cookie boxes, all were delivered to fire stations and the police station. We welcomed women from our church family and outside the church family to participate in our Mother's Day Tea/ Derby Hat Contest. We welcomed several youth groups this past summer, who love to stop at St. John's because we have showers! They were also treated to a feast by a fantastic crew. We welcomed our TOPS group, where people learn ways to lose weight in a healthy and sustainable way. The Cerbat Garden Club calls our fellowship home for their meetings and fundraising luncheon. So does the Kingman Morning Glories chapter. This year, through their fundraising efforts they were able to award 15 scholarships of \$1,100. We were the host site for Women Making History and the Soroptimist, "Live Your Dream" Awards ceremony. This year they awarded 12 scholarships for a total of \$27,000. This award is specifically for local women and girls who are pursuing higher education or specific job training.

We welcomed Four into the family of God through baptism and we welcomed Six new members into the St. John's United Methodist church family. I know I'm forgetting things Uncle Blakely, but you get the idea. We are VERY welcoming!

We were also learning this past year. We learned through our Wednesday Night Potluck and Bible Study. We finally finished the book of Acts, which we started in 2025. But it is 28 chapters long. With all this information we are now going through some of the letters of Paul and Peter. We did pause our study of Acts for a Lenten study. The Men's Wednesday morning Bible Study continues to

follow its cadence of BS before the BS. BS. And the BS after the BS.

They alternate between studying an Old Testament and New Testament book. We started a new Women's Bible Study this year called "Women Doing Life

Together." Barb Parker was gracious enough to initiate and lead this study. Right now they're working on "Taming the Tongue." I think we can all agree that it is something we could all do better. Judy Norris started a weekly Chair Yoga class. This falls under learning as the participants learn how to move their body in a way that promotes better health! Our Young Adult and Single Adult

fellowships continue to meet on a monthly basis. They've done some pretty fun things like bowling and going to the Mohave College observatory. Our Youth Group also meets on a monthly basis. Along with some Bible Studies, they've had their own fun with water day and bowling. The Widow and Widowers Fellowship meets monthly and more. In addition to their 2 monthly meetings, they go to special events like plays at the Beale Street Theater and free concerts. Our three worship services continue to thrive. In August we had an average of 104 in person and 70 online for a total of 174 in worship. We've been learning a lot from our different sermon series too. We made our way through the whole book of James. Jim Time sure gave me some sore muscles. Jonah was a lot to swallow, but our Fish Tales gave us a lot to think about. Our Lenten sermon series led us through Psalms that reflect the events of Christ's passion. We also had some amazing guest speakers including Dave Kopecky, Jeanne Thurman, and Gail Padwick-Gates. By popular demand, we even held combined worship services the Sundays after Christmas and Easter. Again, I'm sure I'm forgetting something. But I think we can all agree that we are LEARNING in so many ways.

Last but not least we've been working. Everything that I mentioned under welcoming and learning required work on someone's part. Many hours are spent with setting up, serving, and cleaning up after our many events. Multiple times in a year all of the tables and chairs need to be taken up and put back again.

I'm grateful for the many who are willing to do that. Our parking lots were refinished and repainted. They look so good! One of our biggest accomplishments where work was concerned this year was in the management of the \$100,000 security grant we received. Big thanks goes to Bob Parker for the many hours he spent contacting vendors, being a part of the walk-throughs, coordinating installation times, and ensuring all the work was done satisfactorily. The rest of the security team also participated in multiple meetings to make sure that everything we needed to complete by May 31st would get done. We spent all but .31 cents of the total grant. With this work and money, we now have new commercial grade chain link fencing around the preschool and the back of the education wing. (This was a popular place for homeless camps.) Each new area of fencing has a walk through and drive through gate. We have a gate between the back parking area and the rest of the church. We also have push-bar gates for the two doors at the back of the sanctuary. (Another popular place for the homeless.) We have 31 bollards across the preschool and church parking lots. Finally we have 14 state-of-the-art cameras with 23 heads. These are positioned around the preschool, education wing, sanctuary, parking lots, and walkways. The system stores 30 days of footage for us so we can check on things that happened in the past. It also allows us to set up notifications for when activity is in an area where there shouldn't be any. We are much safer that we were before the work of this grant.

Uncle Blakeley, you must continue to be very proud of what we are today. We continue to live out the United Methodist Mission to Make Disciples of Jesus Christ for the Transformation of the World. We are fully embracing our purpose statement, which means we are Welcoming, Learning, and Working.

We never think we're doing enough to be God's hands and feet on this earth. Just look at what you started Uncle Blakeley, just look at what you started.

The Tip

The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each one must give as he has made up his mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. –2 Corinthians 9:6-7

Consider the following story:

Years ago, a 10-year-old boy approached the counter of a soda shop and climbed onto a stool.

“What does an ice cream sundae cost?” he asked the waitress.

“Fifty cents,” she answered.

The youngster reached deep in his pockets and pulled out an assortment of change, counting it carefully as the waitress grew impatient. She had “bigger” customers to wait on.

“Well, how much would just plain ice cream be?” the boy asked.

The waitress responded with noticeable irritation in her voice, “Thirty-five cents.”

Again, the boy slowly counted his money. “May I have some plain ice cream in a dish then, please?” He gave the waitress the correct amount, and she brought him the ice cream.

Later, the waitress returned to clear the boy’s dish and when she picked it up, she felt a lump form in her throat. There on the counter the boy had left two nickels and five pennies. She realized that he had had enough money for the sundae but sacrificed it so that he could leave her a tip.

A generous heart is a rare gift indeed. How often is it easier to hold on to what we think we need instead of remembering to be generous? The child in the story above could easily justify buying a sundae, running over with his favorite toppings and topped with frothy whipped cream and a cherry. After all, he’s just a kid. Nobody expects him to leave a tip.

I try to always be generous not only to the waitress at the restaurant, but also when I am giving to the church. I have been amazed since the time that my wife and I joined Saint Johns, the service that our church provides not only to our congregation, but to the community as well. Remember, we are called to make new and stronger disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. I would like to encourage you to be generous in your giving this new season.

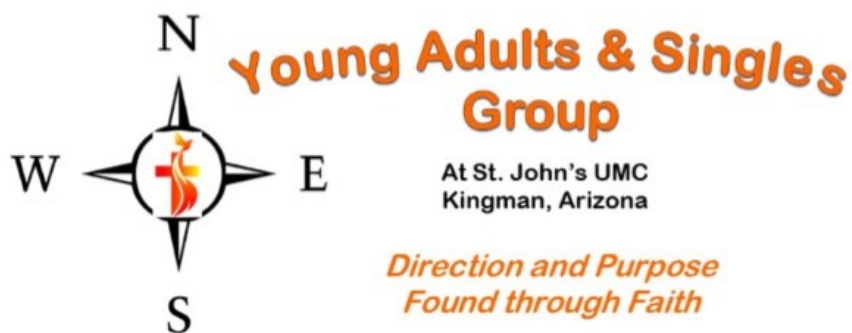
