Pastor's Corner

Where do you run for refuge when life gets overwhelming? What truths do you turn to? I have always loved Psalm 46. I've read it, quoted it, and shared it with many in their times of need.

I have a fun little myth about Psalm 46 as written in the King James Version. The King James Version was translated during the early 1600s. The effort started in 1608 and was finished in 1611. Can you guess which beloved playwright lived during this time period? Yes! Shakespeare! Such a notable literary figure would surely have helped with this translation. Shakespeare was 46 years old the year before the KJV was published. The myth? Shakespeare put his mark on Psalm 46 to mark his 46th birthday. How did he do this? If you count 46 words from the beginning of the psalm...you'll find the word Shake. If you count 46 words in from the end of the psalm, you'll find the word spear. So forever, Shakespeare would be part of the bible. And that's your biblical myth for the month.

For this month's newsletter, let's look at ways Psalm 46 helps us redirect our efforts and rest in God.

Psalm 46 tells us that Enough is Enough!

Psalm 46:10 reads in the translation the Message "Step out of the traffic! Take a long, loving look at me, your High God, above politics, above everything.""

Many translations use "Be still" or, "we need to come aside from the hustle and bustle of daily life and get alone with God." Is that all that's being said here? When we look at verses 8-11 of the final part of this Psalm, we better understand the full context of verse 10.

"Come, see the Lord's deeds, what devastation he has imposed on the earth—bringing wars to an end in every corner of the world, breaking the bow and shattering the spear, burning chariots with fire. "That's enough! Now know that I am God! I am exalted among all nations; I am exalted throughout the world!" The Lord of heavenly forces is with us! The God of Jacob is our place of safety. Selah

Verses 8, 9, and 11 refer to aspects of war and fighting. In a discussion about war and fighting, simply saying "be still" is too tame. We need to say, "Enough is Enough".

Pausing during times of strife, to be sure that we are truly fighting the Lord's battles and not fighting against the Lord seems appropriate! We step back for a moment and say God you are God—Do as you with us and anyone else.

Psalm 46 begins with: "The Lord is my refuge and strength, a very present help in time of trouble. Therefore, we will not fear, though the earth gives way ... The Lord of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our fortress." This means that we can stop fighting in our own strength and actually rest in Him.

Psalm 46 shows us how to Take Refuge in God

It was April 1521. A ramshackle cart was wobbling its way to Worms, Germany. This ramshackle cart belonged to Martin Luther. Martin Luther was summoned to appear before the Emperor and Catholic prelates to give an account of the new "heresy" he was teaching called "justification by faith alone." Johann Eck, a German Scholastic theologian, laid out all of Luther's writings and made a firm request. Recant and return to a right relationship with the Catholic church. The stakes were very high. The Catholic church did not take to kindly to heretics.

Luther returned to his room to think about his answer. As the story goes, his Bible fell open and guess what it fell open to? Psalm 46. This was the encouragement that Luther needed to stand before his detractors the next morning and say:

"Unless I am convinced by Scripture and plain reason—I do not accept the authority of the popes and councils, for they have contradicted each other—my conscience is captive to the Word of God. I cannot and I will not recant anything for to go against conscience is neither right nor safe. God help me. Amen."

The Reformation had begun!

Psalm 46 was Martin Luther's favorite Psalm. During the dark and dangerous periods of the Reformation, Luther would turn to his friend Philip Melanchthon and exclaim: "Let's sing the 46th Psalm, and let the devil do his worst!" It inspired one of his greatest hymns. "A Mighty Fortress is Our God."

No other Psalm expresses the tremendous truth that God's presence and power are with us always. In it, God offers two kinds of help: a stronghold into which we can flee and a source of strength by which we can face an uncertain future.

Psalm 46 shows us how to Pause and Think. It's divided into three stanzas, each ending with this very mysterious Hebrew word "Selah." "Selah" was a type of musical notation indicating a pause in the music for contemplation on what was just sung. We can translate it today into, "Pause and think!"

When the mountains quake, the Lord is my refuge and strength. Selah! When nations are in uproar and kingdoms fall, the Lord almighty is with us. Selah! "Enough is Enough! Know that I am God, exalted among the nations, the Lord of Armies is with us. Selah!"

Every year brings us 365 days of uncertainty. Every day brings us 24 hours of uncertainty. But in every second of every hour of every day, God's presence and power is available to us. What does the future hold? It really doesn't matter, does it, as long as Psalm 46 is true! When you need to know that God's presence and power is there, try reflecting on Psalm 46 or any other passage. When you do, may I suggest ending it with "Selah"? To do that is to tell God, "I need to pause and think about that"

A Message from Our Lay Leader Points to Ponder

He replied, "I know nothing about that one way or the other. But I know one thing for sure: I was blind, and now I see. John 9:25

Kate Hankey was a British girl who lived in London in the mid-1800s. Her family was active in their church, and Kate started teaching Sunday school while still in her teens. When she was 18, she organized a Bible study for girls who worked in a nearby factory. When her brother fell ill while working in Africa, it was Kate who travelled there to tend to him. This adventure prompted a desire for mission work. When she was about 30, Kate fell ill, and her doctors gave her a long time of bed rest. With nothing to do and a restless spirit, Kate began to write poems. In one, she wrote of her passion for telling people about the love of Jesus. She titled it, "The Old, Old, Story." It made its way into publication and was quoted at the conclusion of an international convention of the YMCA. Many people were stuck by the beauty and message of the poem. Songwriter William Doane, who was in the crowd that day, took a portion of Kate's poem and wrote the hymn, "Tell Me the Old, Old Story." Another budding songwriter, William Fischer, took another portion of Kate's poem and created a tune that became, "I Love to Tell the Story." "I love to tell the story. T'will be my theme in Glory. To tell the old, old story, of Jesus and his love."

How about us? Do we love to tell the story? For some of us, telling others about what God has done for us is very easy, but I am guessing that for most of us, it is not. For some, our faith is very personal and not easy to put into words. Others of us may not want to appear to be judgmental towards others, or fear that we are inadequate in our knowledge of God, or the Bible, to do a good job in sharing our faith. Some of us belong to the order of "Preach the Gospel at all times. Use words if necessary." Now it is true that living our lives in a way that shows our faith is very important, but we should be ready to back that up with our own words of faith. After all, there are a lot of people out there that do nice things for others or are kind, but don't know Jesus. When I have the chance to share my faith, and I start to get cold feet, I remember the blind man from the Bible who was grilled by the authorities to explain how a man who was obviously a sinner (since Jesus had healed the man, and therefor did work, on the Sabbath, a sin.) The man's answer is one that all of us should hold up as the ultimate example of a faith well spoken, "I don't know everything. I just know that I was blind, and now I can see." You don't have to be a Bible scholar or have all the answers. You just share, "This is what God has done for me. If you allow it, God will do it for you." It's that simple. Remember Paul's words from Romans 10:14, "But how can they call on him to save them unless they believe in him? And how can they believe in him if they have never heard about him? And how can they hear about him unless someone tells them?" You or I might be the only doorway a fiend, family member, co-worker ever gets to God. Do we keep the door shut or open it up and invite them inside? Courage, friends!



A Message from Our Finance Director

Hello Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

Just wanted to give you a quick update on our year to date and monthly income to expenses. Giving for the month of March ended up being \$11,399.50 which includes \$209 in other income. Our expenses for the month were \$21,593.34, giving us a negative net income of -\$10,193.74. As a reminder, our weekly budgetary needs are \$6956.25. Our weekly spending was below our budget for the month by \$6,231.66 which is a positive, but our giving still needs to increase to meet our budgetary needs.

Giving for the year to date through April 20 is \$59,929.25 including other income of \$900.55. Our expenses through April 20th are \$92,787.41 giving us a negative net income of \$32,858.16 for the year so far.

Giving for April through the 20th is \$14,714.26. Our expenses for the month are \$22,548.15, or a negative net income of -\$7,833.89.

We have a new online giving platform, check it out on the church website. This is an easy way to set up your ongoing weekly or monthly giving.
