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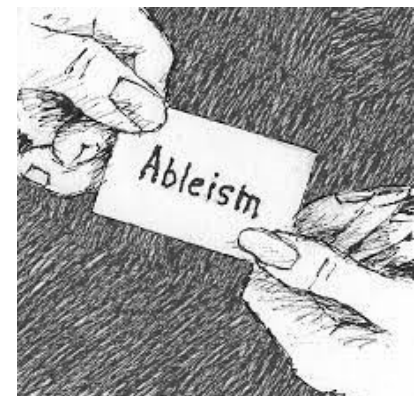
Pastor's Corner

At my first Annual Conference in 2019 I received a square pin that over time has disintegrated because I wore it so much. My boyfriend Curt tried to fix it, so it now has burnished edges. Finally I had to admit it, I could no longer wear it. But I still have it because it is that special to me. It lists several terms that are crossed out. It ends with Just. LOVE!

One of the scratched-out terms on this pin that has raised questions is the term "ableism". This isn't a term I was familiar with for the longest time, but throughout the years I've felt the effects of what it stands for through my disabled daughters. For June I want to spend time talking about what ableism is and why we as United Methodists should want to be more aware of it. Ableism is by definition, "a system of attitudes, beliefs, and actions that communicates that persons with disabilities have less value than non-disabled persons. It assumes that "normal" is a valid social construction. An example of ableism in the church would be assuming that someone who is blind would not be able to be a liturgist. Another example would be of offering to pray for someone with disabilities regardless of whether or not they've asked for it.

It's hard for those of us who do not have a disability to fully understand how we might unknowingly contribute to ableism. Have you ever heard someone comment about "how much worse Paula" is for having to live in a wheelchair" or "I'm glad I'm not hard of hearing"? Those are ways in which people participate in ableism.

Do you know people who assume that someone with a speech impediment is not intelligent? Or those who think that someone with autism is automatically a troublemaker? I don't believe we as Christians do these things intentionally, we just haven't ever been asked to think about it. Even our social principles, hymns, and liturgies send mixed messages. In the Book of Discipline, ¶162 describes the rights of persons with disabilities. Of course, the basic message of this paragraph is to fully include those with disabilities. The list of disabilities calls attention to their "otherness". One of our most beloved hymns, *Amazing Grace*, uses the words "was blind, but now I see". Blindness here is being equated to sinfulness. Did John Newton realize this when he was writing this hymn? It is possible, but the world was also very different back then. All of the medical reasons for blindness were not known. Their best guess was that something sinful had happened to cause blindness. Using this back when it was written would have made a lot more sense.

I come to worship at church to pray, praise, and be thankful.

I come to church to grow my connections in the Holy Spirit.

Jesus called his disciples on the idea that blindness was related to sin in John 9. Before Jesus heals a blind man, his disciples ask “Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?” Jesus tells them, “Neither this man nor his parents sinned, but this happened so that the works of God might be displayed in him.” Jesus made it clear that disabilities are not the result of sin.

I’ve seen ableism acted upon my daughters many times, yes even in churches. Assumptions are made about their abilities based on how they both look, act, dress, & talk. It really hurts, especially since I know how capable they both are. No doubt it hurts them too. It’s just not how Christians should act.

At St John’s UMC, we do have somethings that show compassion for those with disabilities. We have cut spaces in our pews for those with wheelchairs or walkers. We have hearing assistance devices for those that cannot hear as well. Our projector makes it easier for people to see the order of service. I do believe there are other things we can improve. For example, the altar area is not accessible. This means those with disabilities have more difficulty participating in our music programs, being a liturgist, or being a guest speaker. What can we do to make this area more accessible?

There are negative impacts of not addressing ableism. First and foremost, as Methodists we say we “do no harm”. Second our baptismal vows cause us to stand against oppression and injustice wherever it appears. Beyond that we are missing an opportunity to discover gifts and talents of individuals just because we assume they can’t do it. If this means that those with disabilities won’t attend our church, then we also lose an ability to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. Plus, we never know what the future holds and when we ourselves might become disabled.

That is ableism and that is its impact on both individuals and churches. I realize this isn’t an easy topic, but we don’t shy away because of that do we?

Greetings from the Parish Nurse



Greetings everyone! I have really been enjoying the spring season this year because it has been one of the only times in memory that we have actually had a real spring instead of just waking up one day in April -or even March!-to 95 degree weather! During this time I have been planting vegetables and flowers and since it is the first time I have actually gardened, I came across a list of some poisonous plants some of which I was not aware of and so with an eye towards our beloved pets and children, I thought I would share this information. Some of these you may not be aware of!

- Bittersweet nightshade - a woody weed with red berries-all parts of the plant are toxic, including bark leaves and sap.
- Chinese Lanterns-related to bittersweet nightshade, the leaves, fruit are toxic. The fruit's husk is green and changing to yellow and then is orange by fall .
- Foxglove-these are tall flowering plants (and for sale at Home Depot I have noticed). If consumed by humans, the flowers, leaves, roots and stems are among eat most toxic specimens commonly grown on landscapes.
- Mountain Laurel-related to azaleas and rhododendrons, belonging to the heath family and the ark, sap, leaves, and flowers are toxic.
- Castor Bean-a tropical plant often grown as a potted plant, the leaves, stalk and seed heads are all attractive. The laxative Castor Oil is derived from this plant but so is the deadly toxin ricin.
- Yew-grown in sun or shade, but its fleshy bright red berries contain a toxic seed. The leaves are toxic to humans and animals
- Easter Lily (*Lilium longiflorum*)-While the sap of the stems and leaves can e toxic to humans, Easter Lilies and Stargazer Lilies are more problematic as they are very toxic for cats.
- Stinging Nettles (*Urtica sap*) is not a plant you want to brush up against when working out in the yard, though NOT to be confused with dead nettles, a perennial used as a ground cover in shady areas.
- Yellow Dock (*Rumex sp*) also known as Sorrel- is toxic to dogs. The toxicity to humans is low.
- Lantana (*Lantana camera*) berries, leaves and sap are all toxic.
- Lily of the Valley(*convallaria majalis*)-toxic in large amounts
- White Baneberry (*actaea*) related to buttercup. Berries can be red or white.
- Tansy (*Tanacetum vulgate*) toxic to people and

animals especially livestock.

- Oleander (*Nerium oleander*)-highly toxic when touched or eaten by humans or animals. Even when planting oleander, wear protective clothing.
- Mistletoe (*Phoradendron spp.*, *Arceuthobium spp.*)some times are more toxic to humans and animals than others when ingested.
- Jimsonweed (*Datura stramonium*)-This grows wild all over our area! highly toxic to both humans and animals when ingested. Part of the nightshade family.

Additionally many common plants are toxic for pets, including bulbs like lilies, autumn crocus, tulips, hyacinths, and daffodils in addition to shrubs like oleander and wildflowers like lily of the valley, Common houseplants toxic to pets include snake, jade, pathos's philodendrons, and dumb cane plants. This is only a short list of plants that are not safe for pets.

What to do if you touch a poisonous plant

- Immediately rinse your skin with rubbing alcohol, poison plant wash or a degreasing dishwashing soap or detergent, and lots of water. Scrub under your nails using a brush. Keep rinsing and do it frequently so non of the solutions you are using drugs on your skin or spread the urushiol (oily resin in poisonous plants)
- Apply wet compresses, calamine lotion, or hydrocortisone cream to the skin to reduce itching and blistering
- Seek immediate medical attention if you have severe allergic reaction, difficulty breathing, or swelling on your body or face.

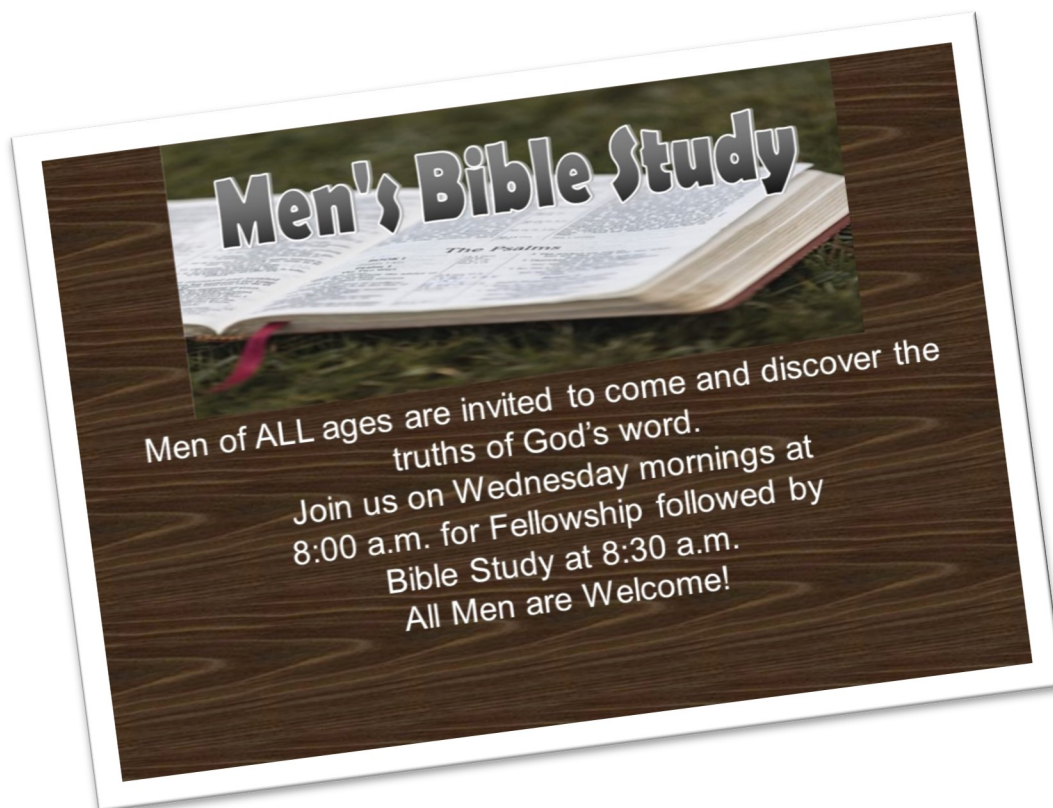
