Reflections from the Rev.

This month we will finish our journey through the American Deaconess movement. We've covered what I hope you've found to be some pretty amazing women who are a vital part of the fabric of American Methodism. This month we will bring the movement up to the current day. Even back in the late 19th and early 20th century members of the Deaconess movement were seeing the negative impacts of things like immigration, urbanization, and industrialization.

Their training prepared them to be able to gather data and share it with other church women. These women took that information and used it to promote changes to improve society. Some issues they tackled included child labor laws and better conditions for working women.

The deaconess movement started to raise some very important questions. The more the deaconesses worked in the "City Field", the more they began to notice things. They started to see urban poverty. They started to see the decay and corruption. They didn't just operate on emotion though, they also leaned on science. They believed that studying society in a scientific way was crucial to coming up with solutions for social problems. They pointed out comparisons in economic disparity. For example, the wages of a merchant versus a washer women.

They also pointed out the fact that blaming the victim was a pathway to complacency. They demonstrated to the fullest the compassion of Christ. As Isabelle Horton stated in an issue of the Deaconess Advocate, "These were not born paupers, but have had pauperism thrust upon them...once down, there is scarcely one chance in a thousand to regain his footing."

Is it any coincidence that these eye-opening experiences followed on the heels of the social gospel initiatives of the early 20th century?

The Social Gospel movement had a noble endeavor.

Its proponents were convinced that while conversion and individual responsibility were important, Christians must address social structures that stood in the way of living out the traits of the kingdom of God. Another important discovery they made is that "charity was insufficient to address the needs of the poor." They recognized that a moral Christian home was unattainable when saloons tempted fathers, children had to work to support the home, young girls were forced into prostitution, and the poor were forced into over-crowded and unsanitary conditions.

The attraction to merely giving money waned and women realized they had to start actively advocating for social economic and political change. They funneled their money and time to education, recreation centers, and other reforms. They began to take on issues like temperance. Francis Willard lead the cause and the Woman's Christian Temperance Union. She also was a strong advocate for the women's voter rights, labor unions, fair wages for women, prison reform, and public kindergartens.

In the 1960s a restructuring of the role of deacons began to take place across all denominations, with conscientious efforts made towards clearer definitions and job descriptions. While in 1976 the United Methodist Church approved the use of the phrase diaconal ministers, by 1996 they began discussing a plan for phasing out the diaconal offices. Churches are actively working to have laity take over the responsibilities that would be held by a deacon. There are certainly benefits to encouraging lay involvement in the churches, retention being the biggest reason. There is concern that the presence of deacons has actually discouraged more lay involvement. There is also the thought that the deaconess movement was a stop gap as women worked towards inclusion into the world of ordained elders. Now that women can be ordained as elders, the need for the deaconess movement has diminished.

Without the deaconesses, who will stand up for the poor? Who will advocate for the better future for society? Are the laity up to the task? They might if they have the outlook that Carole Cartwright has. She describes her entry to Methodism like this. "When they visited The United Methodist Church, all of them "felt that this is where we belong." Carole says one of her best characteristics is her determination. She says, "Once I recognize a problem, I have to do something about it." Carole is a black woman raised by parents who told her she would always have to work harder, be better, and have an education. She talks about the warmth and mentoring she found at her UMC church. It has led her to greater and greater involvement. She has served in many areas, including her district director of the Status and Role of Women.

With mentoring and nurturing, laywomen and men can take up the causes of the deaconess movement. A common observation across many lay people who were well nurtured and mentored is that they see their respective vocations as a response to God's call. They also have a sense that they are in connection with others in ministry. They recognize that it was mentoring that helped them discover the gifts they had for ministry. They are able to see that what they do is an authentic reflection of who they are and finally they understand that this is a growth process. There are going to be unexpected results along the way.

Although the future of the deaconess movement is uncertain, it is certain that the need for servant ministers will always be present. It is also clear that the deaconess movement of the late 19th century empowered an army that would lead American Methodism through many important social and denominational changes. It was the catalyst for obtaining rights for women and African Americans. It led to healing of many across all gender and race boundaries.

Deaconesses were instrumental in bringing about both physical and spiritual wholeness. As Francis Willard said so eloquently in her introduction to Lucy Rider Meyer's book on Deaconesses, "no action more fully freighted with hope for humanity gilds the sunset glories... than the re-establishment of the order of Deaconesses in almost every branch of the Church Universal.

"She spoke of justice, truth, and love,
How soft her words distilled.
She spoke of God and all the place
Was with His presence filled."

A Message from Our Lay Leader

Hello Saint John's family,

Today I am sharing with you a devotional from the Upper Room, "Many Parts, One Body" submitted by Jeremy K. Mullen

1 Corinthians 12:27 *You are the body of Christ, and each of you is part of it.*

(full text, 1 Corinthians 12:12-27)

In college, I served as a volunteer counselor a few weeks each summer at a Christian camp.

One of my favorite camp activities involved one of my favorite foods: ice cream. We would ask the camp kitchen to help us make ice cream, and they would give us an old-fashioned, hand-cranked ice cream maker and all the ingredients needed. I remember telling my campers that each ingredient was important in making the ice cream turn out right.

Like the ice cream ingredients, each member of the church is important. Each has a part to play as they use their spiritual gifts and share their time, talents, and resources. The community of believers is the body of Christ, and each member of that body is important, with a unique purpose and function. We should never think that we, or others in the body, don't matter because of the spiritual gift or ministry we do or do not have. So let us go—carrying Christ's love with us—and make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.



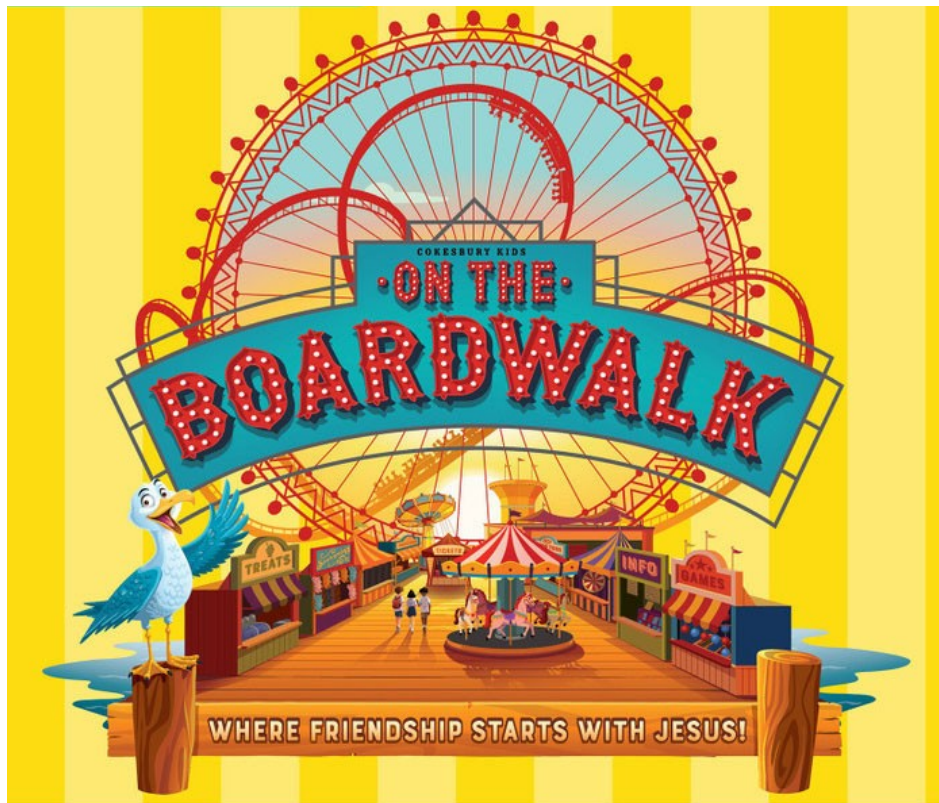
